EDITOR'S EASTER MESSAGE

Since last December, when I wrote my previous message for the newsletter, I have had lingering thoughts about the Savior--about who He is and my relationship to Him. Ironically, as circumstances have it, it is my turn to write a message again at Eastertime. Even though Easter has passed and my thoughts may seem somewhat belated, I feel it is important to say something to keep our minds focused on the Savior, especially because of our special responsibility to Him as church organists and musicians.

I was greatly uplifted and inspired after listening to the recent LDS World Conference. There were many important and inspiring things spoken, but I don't think I'll ever forget the power of the hymn "The Spirit of God Like a Fire is Burning" when it was sung. It seemed as if all the hosts of heaven were singing along, too, rejoicing in the commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the Salt Lake Temple.

At that time, my thoughts were already drawn to the Savior, because I was in charge of our Primary's Easter Activity, and was trying to figure out a way to teach the children about Christ's resurrection. As a result, I found myself growing closer to the Savior and having a greater appreciation for His life and sacrifice (and how important each of us is to Him, too).

Because of these experiences, I felt compelled to try to bring this same feeling into our Sacrament Meeting the following Easter Sunday, when I played the organ. As I did so, I was filled with the Spirit.

I know that when my thoughts are thus focused as I play the organ, I can better "communicate" the messages of the hymns to those in the congregation--so that they will not only sing the hymns but "feel" them, too, (just as I felt "The Spirit of God" sung in the

Salt Lake Tabernacle). Also, when I prayerfully select prelude and postlude music, I can set a more reverential tone.

All of you have probably had these special kinds of experiences. When we have sincerely and spiritually prepared ourselves to invite the Spirit to attend our meetings, people appreciate this even though they may not say so directly; we can tell by the way they sing and by their reverence.

One of the greatest challenges we face is to maintain these sacred feelings week by week (to "endure to the end"). We have good days and bad days—that's just a part of life. But as long as we keep striving to increase our faith in the Savior and do His will, we'll succeed in uplifting the people in our congregations.

I am grateful I have had the opportunity to meet such wonderful people as each of you in our Chapter. I have learned much from you. Not only have your varied talents and expertise influenced and helped me but so also have your exemplary lives. Thank you for enriching mine.

The Oak Hills 6th Ward enlisted my help to accompany their ward choir for its annual musical Easter Program, and in doing so I became acquainted with a very special lady whom I would like to spotlight this month-Lalah Matheson.

Christine Davis, the choir director (a BYU music graduate in violin and an outstanding musician) told me when she called that the Oak Hills 6th Ward had a well established, rich choral tradition because of the efforts of Lalah Matheson who had led the choir for years and inspired her as a young person to strive for excellence in her musical pursuits.

Lalah was born in Moroni, Utah. Her father, Brother Anderson, was the music teacher in the high school in Moroni--teaching all the choir, band, and orchestra classes. His outstanding musicianship inspired Lalah to develop her musical talents. She said she has been playing the piano as long as she can remember. Lalah graduated from the University of Utah with a Speech and English major and a Music minor. Her husband is a radiologist, and they have six children-four girls and two boys.

Lalah has held every music calling in the LDS Church. She especially enjoyed working with the youth. Christ, our redeemer, passed the self-same way.


