*May Frantic Organist Story*

I have a friend who lives in Lenoir, North Carolina. About the only thing I can possibly hold against him is his taste in music. Notable among his favorites is Tennessee Ernie Ford. I kid you not.

A couple of years ago, he came to Los Angeles for a visit armed with a shoe-box full of cassette tapes that he had "duped" from his record collection as a treat for me, including about a half-dozen T. E. Ford tapes. Lucky me. \*sigh\*

He came with me to church on Sunday morning and brought his box of tapes with him, figuring he could listen to them on the sanctuary sound system as I got ready for the service.

Well, do I have to tell you that I had more than my fill of Tennessee Ernie Ford that morning, a good hour's worth. The last song on the last tape finally faded off upon a resounding hillbilly coda just as Sunday School ended and we were ready to begin the service.

I didn't think any more about the Tennessee Ernie Ford tape, assuming my friend had taken care of it.

Big mistake.

We have a very extensive prayer time at Holy Trinity, during which people stand and give prayer petitions, testimonies, etc. During prayer time on this particular Sunday, one of our old-faithful choir members was giving her usual long-winded praise report. After going on and on and on, she paused dramatically then resumed, "I just want to say that---"

Suddenly, from the heavens above (well, not quite THAT high--in reality, from the P.A. speakers up behind the organ grille), a rinky-dink piano started merrily tinkling out an introduction--"Dee-de-dee-dee-dee-deeee-deee-deeeee."

It got worse.

For, then, Tennessee Ernie Ford and a crooning male quartet started belting a rousing, "One glad morning when I rise up--laa la-la la la laaaa" [I can't recall all the words] and then more "DEE-DE-DE-DEE-DEE - CLOMP--BANG--BOOM-" on piano, drums, sax, banjo, kazoo, accordion; whatever the heck his backup orchestra was using!

I had to gallop ACROSS the chancel from the organ console where I had been tendering comforting solaces on the Flute Celeste, wrestle open the door to the little room behind the chancel containing the sound system and tape deck, and shut off the confounded tape!

Needless to say, I was not very amused nor was the pastor; but my choir was in stitches and soon some of them finally couldn't hold it in any longer and burst into gales of laughter. Eventually, cautious order was restored and we got back to the solemnities of Prayer Time.

Then just before the pastor began his sermon (this pastor is a good talker so I stick around to listen!), he leaned over the podium and--to everyone's unabashed merriment--asked me, "Um...Are there any more surprises on the sound system?"

Afterward, I figured out what had happened. The church's PA tape deck has an "auto-loop" feature that will play the same tape over and over. It was my unfortunate fate that the last tape my friend had played only had 10 or 15 minutes of music at the top of the tape, then the rest of it was blank. When the music stopped, neither of us thought anymore about it.

So what actually had occurred was that the balance of the tape, with nothing on it, had continued to silently roll; both sides; then when it got to the end it flipped back to side one and started over again! And, of course, at the worst possible time.

We tape all our Sunday morning services, and I actually have a tape of that Sunday. When I listen to it now, I must admit it does give me a big belly-laugh when our dear Miss Alice is droning on and on, and then right in the middle of her dramatic testimony that merry "Dee-de-de-deee-dee-deeee-deee-deeeee" erupts from on high!
