Background Information about Richard Adams

First of all, Richard says that he is not an organist, but his wife Patty can almost play with pedals. They have lived in Orem for the last 23 years, and have sung with the Utah Baroque Ensemble for over 10 years.

Richard got interested in organs rather young. Growing up in Phoenix, he used to play around with the pipe organs in the old second ward and third ward buildings (along with the player piano in the "cultural" hall).

Then on his mission in Oklahoma, he and Eldon Ives went exploring the organ loft at the Wichita, Kansas Stake Center. That impressed Eldon enough that he later went to work for Schoenstein's in San Francisco. Now, he has a woodworking shop in Orem, and only dabbles in organ building (when Richard need his help). Richard had hopes of getting a Flentrop kit cabinet organ back then, but never did.

Then about 15 years ago, Richard learned about reed organs and got one--then another, and another. These were easy to get going, but hard to move. Then about 7 years ago, Richard told Eldon to be on the lookout for an organ. Eldon told him that BYU had just sold off three Wicks practice organs. Too bad.

Eldon then offered Richard the old (1948) Möller he had gotten from Mike Ohman, which they had removed and packed up from the old Christian Science church, er, reading room, in Provo, when it was sold to the theater group. The pipework was pristine and so was the case. He sold it to Richard and loaded it into Richard's garage.

Richard had to completely rewire it (he and Mike could not get the wires through the floor). Richard gave Eldon the old white manufacturer blower and got a new Ventus,

which Eldon helped Richard enclose in the pipe box.

Then a couple of years ago, Richard got his second pipe organ, a little one manual modern baroque chamber organ with a pull-down pedal, from an unknown builder in Germany, through Florida. It is still a work in progress, although it is playable now.

After getting all these "children," he and his wife decided it was time to build a room to house them all, so last summer they added an "organ room" behind their garage. It has a very high ceiling, and . . . you will just have to come and see it.

Richard is looking to get a nicer, taller, cooler house organ--a tracker with a cool case. In the mean time, he and his wife just go to the Eccles Organ Festival concerts, tape the Tab Choir, and eat at Organ Stop Pizza whenever they go to Phoenix.

Richard recently saw Eldon's set of pipes which he still builds for Schoenstein's, as they were ready for shipping. Then on a subsequent business trip to San Francisco, he visited Schoenstein's and saw the same pipes finished by them, all ready to go. The company really appreciates his workmanship.

Richard said not to ask him about his harpsichord kit that he has and is planning on finishing before he turns 30. ☺

This sounds like we have our own "Hoopernacle" right here in Utah Valley. So, bring your own shoes and music and have fun playing all these organs!

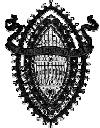
