### Black Bean Salad Ala Brazil

Combine together and chill:

- 2 cups cooked black beans, drained
- 10 oz. frozen corn
- 1 can palm hearts, sliced
- 2 large tomatoes, seeded and diced
- 1/2 cup chopped cilantro
- 1/2 large red onion, diced
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 3 T fresh lime juice
- 1 t ground coriander

Serve on bed of fresh spinach leaves, torn.

## OCTOBER CHAPTER MEETING
