Voices from Pipe Organ Encounter 2016

In this monthly column, we will have the opportunity to hear the experiences of youth who attended Pipe Organ Encounter in July 2016, and hopefully be inspired by their youthful enthusiasm and passionate musicianship.

I became interested in the organ at a young age. For as long as I can remember, my mom has been an organist in the Lutheran Church. I've loved hearing the power the organ has to inspire people to sing all these years. I love the contrasting sounds it can make, from barely audible strings, to heralding trumpets. I became more interested than ever when my parents bought an antique ninety-year-old pipe organ for my mom and me to practice on. It came in pieces and I had a fun time sorting the pipes, placing them on the wind chests, and wiring it all together. Upon hearing we bought a pipe organ, my uncle in Las Vegas began looking for organ building workshops. But what he found instead was the POE. He told me I would get to play the famous Tabernacle Organ, so I decided to go.

Before I went to the POE, I was beginning to think there were no other kids my age that appreciated the organ.

But I was pleased to find out there were quite a few. I was also surprised that kids as far away as Colorado, California, Arizona, Alaska, and South Carolina came all the way they did to learn about organs. That was one of my favorite parts, just meeting other organ enthusiasts.

I had lessons everyday with Sheri Peterson at St. Ambrose Catholic Church. It was a wonderful experience. I also had the pleasure of attending master classes with Dr. Don Cook, a BYU organ professor, and Clay Christiansen, a Tabernacle Organist. We also went to see Richard Elliott, the principal Tabernacle organist, in a recital. After listening to the Tabernacle organists' amazing music online for years, it was nice to meet them in person.

I also enjoyed touring BYU's organ department and the Bigelow organ factory. It was fun to see the evolution of the pipe organ, from baroque organs to modern organs. BYU has so many pipe organs just for practicing. I was fascinated to see how organs are built from scratch and voiced at Bigelow. Such a long process! Organs are a true work of art. It takes real craftsmanship to build one.

Most of all, I enjoyed going behind the scenes at the conference center in Salt Lake City. It was intriguing to see how an organ operates on such a large scale, especially since I had installed one on a small scale. Playing it was a thrill. The Tabernacle organ was phenomenal. I remember my first visit to Temple Square when I was little. I thought the organ was amazing, but I never thought I'd actually get to play it someday. It was truly a dream come true.

Overall, the POE was a highly rewarding experience. I recommend it for anyone who is even considering learning to play the organ. Seeing and hearing these amazing instruments inspired me to be a better musician. I would definitely attend a POE again.


