I have recently been reflecting on my time spent as a member of the American Guild of Organists, and pondering some of the wonderful life-long friendships I have cultivated with people in the Guild, which have led to life-directing events.

I joined the Guild at the ripe old age of seventeen in my then-home, upstate New York. My organ teacher invited me to a Guild event he was hosting at his church. During lunch, I ran across the street to an ATM, and withdrew the \$37 for a student membership in the Binghamton chapter of the AGO. I knew it was exactly where I wanted to be.

Fast forward to 2012. I had recently returned home from missionary service, starting another year in the organ performance program at BYU. Enter Sheri. I had first met her in the year previous to my missionary service. When I returned, she was dean of the chapter. She invited me to participate in a master class sponsored by the chapter. This reignited my interest in the Guild. She invited me to participate in other activities, such as the local RCYO competition being held early the next year, in 2013. Although I didn't win, the experience was a vital one to my being an organist. Not only did I gain confidence in my performance abilities, I was also able to meet another friend in the chapter.

Jack, then sub-dean, was assigned to be the assistant to the competitors. In those preparatory hours, as Jack and I chatted, our acquaintanceship grew into a friendship, which is still ongoing today. His encouragement about my hymn-playing and hymn-arranging skills has given me confidence in my hymn work, and has given me many opportunities to perform in hymn sings.

Speaking of hymn sings, I met another friend at a chapter activity back in 2014. We had closed out the year with a hymn sing, where I played my newly-written

arrangement on *How Great the Wisdom and the Love*. During the reception afterwards, I met Bryce, who commented positively on the arrangement, and asked for a copy. After obtaining a copy, he asked if he could share it with his ward leaders; he wanted to perform it with the ward choir. I obliged. He then invited me, with the bishop's permission, to work with the ward choir in performing the piece, and I had the opportunity to be "at the baton" for its performance. It was a fantastic experience, which has reaffirmed my love of choral music. Also, he has since gotten me hooked on Talenti gelato (not an advertisement—it's just really good). Thanks Bryce.

Voices from Abroad

In this monthly column, we will hear from members and friends who have had experiences with the organ and sacred music in farflung places. This month, we will hear from Sarah Maxfield, one of the winners of last spring's UVAGO Youth Scholarship program. Sarah was able to attend the Haarlem International Organ Festival this summer.

Hi! My name is Sarah Maxfield; I turned 16 in June. I've played the organ for 4 years. This summer as part of my musical (organ) education I went to Holland for the Haarlem Orgelfestival. This was an amazing experience for me on several levels, because it taught me how to work hard and set goals to reach my dreams.

Back in December my amazing mom was looking for organ summer camps for me, and this one kept on popping up. I honestly didn't think that I would get in, because I had never been out of the US or Canada for anything, and I didn't think that my skill set at the time would get me in. But I decided to try anyway. In January they sent us the list of music I had to prepare to send in as a recorded audition. I needed to learn a Bach Trio Sonata, and a piece from Messiaen's "La Nativité." I had never in my life played that music. I met many organists who did not believe that I would be able to learn these pieces and perfect them in the time given me. So, I stepped up my game. I increased my practice time to twice the amount I was used to. I was dedicated to getting in, so I practiced the same two

for seven months (and somehow managed to still like them).

The audition was due two months after the music had been released, and as I was between teachers, I had an amazing experience of going to different teachers to learn different viewpoints on the pieces. We recorded, and recorded, and recorded at the U and also the Cathedral of the Madeleine, but I wasn't ready. So, finally, days before the due date I recorded in my teacher's office on a small practice pipe organ. Then came the rigorous process of deciding which take was the best recording to send in. This process was hard, because they all sounded so similar. Because of that, my mother turned in the wrong recording, and had to send an apology letter and the correct recording later.

Finally, the day came that we got the results. I did not get in, except to be a passive participant. Which meant I could not play. They had to choose 8 young talents from the world, and I was the ninth best. Instead, they told me that I could still come, but only to watch. My mother and I decided to go anyway, and I had the opportunity to play on three of the organs, even though at first they said there would be no time for me to play. My favorite by far was the St. Bavo's 17th-century organ, which had been played by Mozart. If I had decided to not work, or to not come because I didn't believe I would be able to play, I would have missed out on a lot.

Organ camp was a great experience; I met a bunch of new friends and played on about 7 organs.

On Tuesday, the second day of camp, we went to the Mormon Tabernacle and the Conference Center and we got to play on the organs at each. They were 5 manual organs with 5,000+ pipes. We also played on the 3 manual organ at St. Ambrose Catholic Church. We met our teachers, who were all really cool, and we practiced every day in various locations around Salt Lake.

On Wednesday, we went to the Bigelow Organ factory (they make tracker organs) and got a tour of the facilities and learned how pipe organs are made. We went to BYU and got a tour of the music department and had a master class with Dr. Don Cook, who is the director of the organ program at BYU. He also performed a Carillon recital for us and let us play on the Carillon.

At our opening social last month, Lella Pomeroy shared with us her experiences behind the Iron Curtain during a Bach organ tour in East Germany in 1985, shortly before the dedication of the Freiberg LDS Temple, which she had the rare opportunity to tour. Lella's presentation was well-organized, engaging, and a joy to hear. Her photos, souvenirs, and reminiscences were a delight, but also at times sobering. So many years after the fall of the Berlin Wall, and with unified Germany a strong and wealthy country now, many of us have forgotten the terrible suffering those of East Germany experienced under Soviet control. "The Soviet Union had bled the country dry," Lella said. A few years later, one of their group guides escaped to Frankfurt and even visited Lella and her mentor Jim Welch in California. 
